
Engagement is more than Behaviour

The double-layered CoP Model, Lee and Brett, 2015





The background

In 2019, we began a series of workshops to explore the future use of digital technologies in the college. We asked two questions:

- What will teaching and learning look like in Hibernia College over the next 5 to 10 years?
- What digital architecture will we need to put into place to support this?

One of the outcomes of this work was the decision to introduce a collaboration platform for staff and students - this is the Hibernia College Cohort app.

The app was launched with staff in January 2021 and went live with the first group of students in April 2021.

Why build collaborative workspaces?



What are the benefits?

Encouraging collaboration in an online environment helps with learner **motivation** & **engagement** in the learning experience.

Collaboration, particularly in an online setting where isolation can be an issue, can also support learners' social, emotional, and psychological **well-being**.

Online students with a stronger sense of community can perceive greater **satisfaction** with their academic programs, thus resulting in **fewer dropouts**.

It should also be noted that learners (and tutors) can have competing **perspectives**, diverse **background** knowledge, and a variety of learning **strategies** and **beliefs**, which need to be taken into account when setting up a collaborative space.

Our Cohort App













- Very rich feature set:
 - Text, audio, video chat
 - Audio and video conferencing
 - Ability to create private sub-groups
 - Document sharing with native viewers
 - Document markup
 - Powerful search, including inside documents

Staff

- Lots of discussion needed before final decision to deploy
 - Content Moderation
 - Group structures
 - Increased workload?
 - Out-of-hours concerns
 - Giving voice to the student
 - Dealing with potential improprieties
- Giving time to allow staff to become comfortable with the technology
 - Training
 - Lots of support
 - Brought staff live 3 months before students
- In the flow of work
 - Collaboration tools only work if they are an integral part of the programme



Students

- No such concerns for students!
- Transitional issues:
 - Trust & Privacy
 - Establishing new patterns
 - How long does it take?
- Email usage
 - Collaborative workspace is the correct structure for ongoing educational dialogue
- Training is needed!





Communication & Cohort

- Escalation procedure
